Welcome to Business Law!

What are we doing this semester?

I will introduce you to basic legal principles in the context of business. We will explore the important intersection between law and business, as well as discuss various ethical issues that arise in business.

This course is designed to provide you with a basic study of legal aspects and concerns of the modern business community. Study of legal systems and constitutional law serve as a background. Emphasis is placed upon contracts, agency, partnerships, and corporations as topics.

What are our learning objectives?

You will gain a general fundamental understanding of the American legal system and certain areas of law, with a more thorough understanding of contract law (PCSB Undergraduate Learning Goal 1).

You will become adept at reading, understanding and applying legal cases, concepts, and definitions of law in the cases to other facts and discussion contexts. (PCSB Undergraduate Learning Goal 1).

You will become able to apply the concepts found in the text, cases, and other reading to current events and personal experience, and to think critically about applying those concepts, both legally and ethically. (PCSB Undergraduate Learning Goals 1 & 5).

You must be prepared to discuss what happened in the chapter, what you learned, what you found interesting, and how you could apply what you learned in a business setting.

Your in-class performance on this task counts toward 5% of your entire grade, so please plan and read accordingly.

The prompt and questions will be provided to you separately before our first class.



What if you're going to miss class?


